Clouds began to form, lightening struck, thunder rolled, but there was no Rehn. (He was already here).


Wandering into the storm came unsuspecting Minnie Pearl Walters, Idy Clare Osborne, and Leo the Lion Peot.

1946-47

The Broncos had another very successful season in basketball, winning 15 and losing 9. Coach piloted his casabans to a Bi-County Championship which makes three Bi-County trophies won under the helm of Coach Thomason.

The Broncos walked away with twin victories over all four Southern Division teams which gives a pretty record in league competition. In two years the Broncos have lost only one league game in eighteen starts and that by a one point margin.

By winning four straight at the start of the season it looked like the team was going places. The fellows lost double victories to the Whitworth Jayvees and Lamont Town Team but were not beaten until the final gun sounded. It was this keen competition that helped powerize the team and whip apparently stronger foes. The last home game of the season saw the Broncs defeat a tough opponent in the Ritzville Townies. In a thriller of an overtime the Broncs came from behind and won by a two point margin.

With supporters following the team in droves the local Hi defeated Davenport by a score of 28 to 22. This game was the Bi-County and the atmosphere told how much the game meant.

The team went to the Northwest District for the 5th year in a row. With the flu hampering the team they went down to defeat at the hands of an undefeated Latah five by a score of 41-37. The next afternoon the Broncos got hot and beat Wilbur 47-31. The third day of the Whitworth Tournament, the hot and cold five from Ritzville lost to a strong Fairfield team by a score of 39-29. Halftime score was 26-19 in the Broncos favor.


