Band has been quite busy keeping the "pep" in the pep band songs played at football and basketball games and some volleyball as well as wrestling matches.




Normally band consists of 42-45 members but this year there is an outrageous mix of 61 freshmen, sophomore, juniors, and seniors.



The varsity cheerleaders went to cheerleading camp last summer to learn how to work together as a team, new cheers, leadership skills, and how to improve school spirit.


