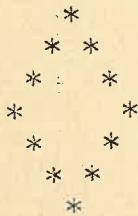

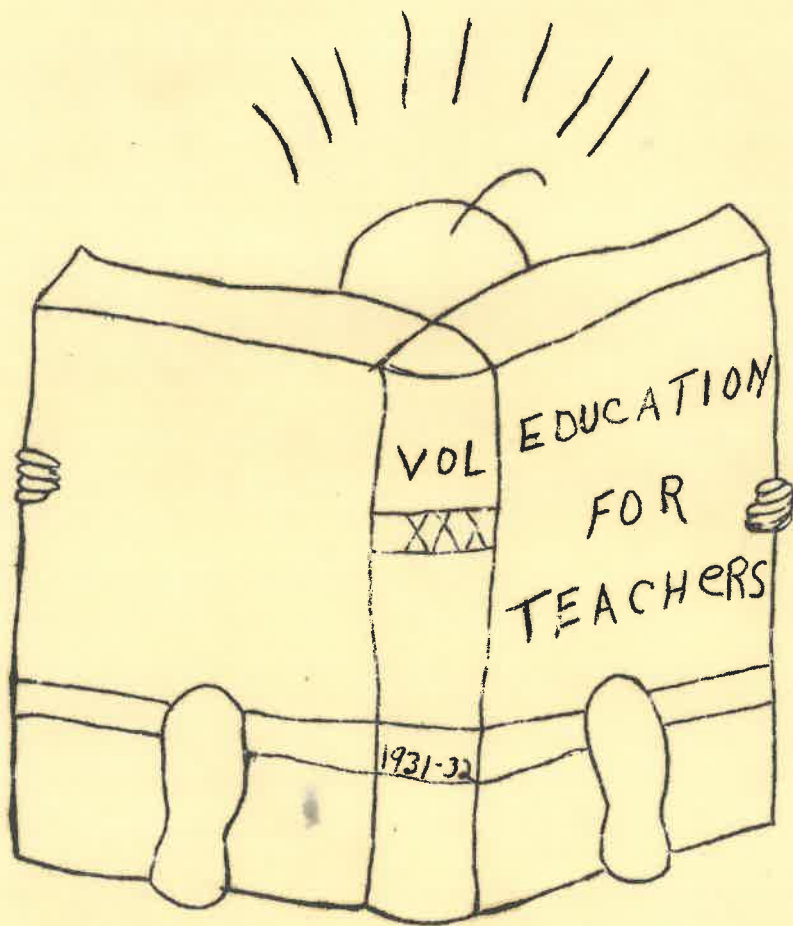
FORWARD

Chapter 3

The next year they were Juniors--upper classmen! Several new students were enrolled in the class, among whom were Martha Schrag, George Knottingham, Robert Franz, Rudolph Smith, Christa Krehbiel, and Thelma Stoops.

The Junior year was a very busy and happy one. That year the Junior Prom--a dance given each year by the Junior Class, was given February 14, in the Lind Auditorium.

On March 24, at six o'clock, the Junior-Senior Banquet, an affair given annually by the Junior Class in honor of the Graduating class, was given. The banquet was served by the Rebekahs in their hall. The Juniors decorated it very prettily in the class colors of Crimson and Grey.

The class had charge of decorating the Gym for Baccalaureate and Commencement which they accomplished in splendid fashion.

-----And so the year closed--with the members of that class making excited and active preparations for the occupying of those most treasured seats of the High School--those of the Senior Rows.

HISTORY OF THE CLASS OF '33

After the dinner which was prepared by the Juniors themselves, a delightful entertainment of speeches, skits, and songs, was presented. 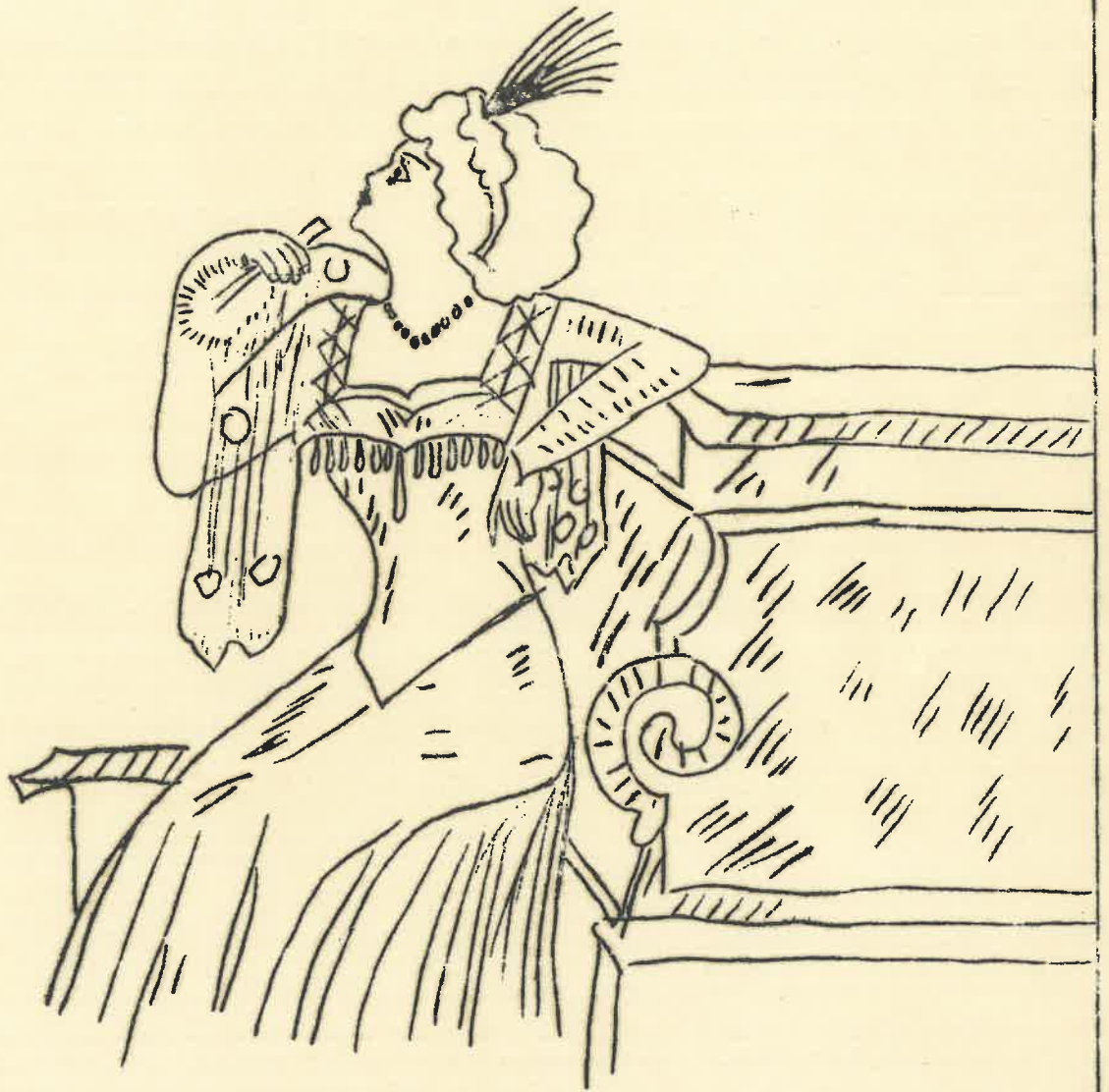

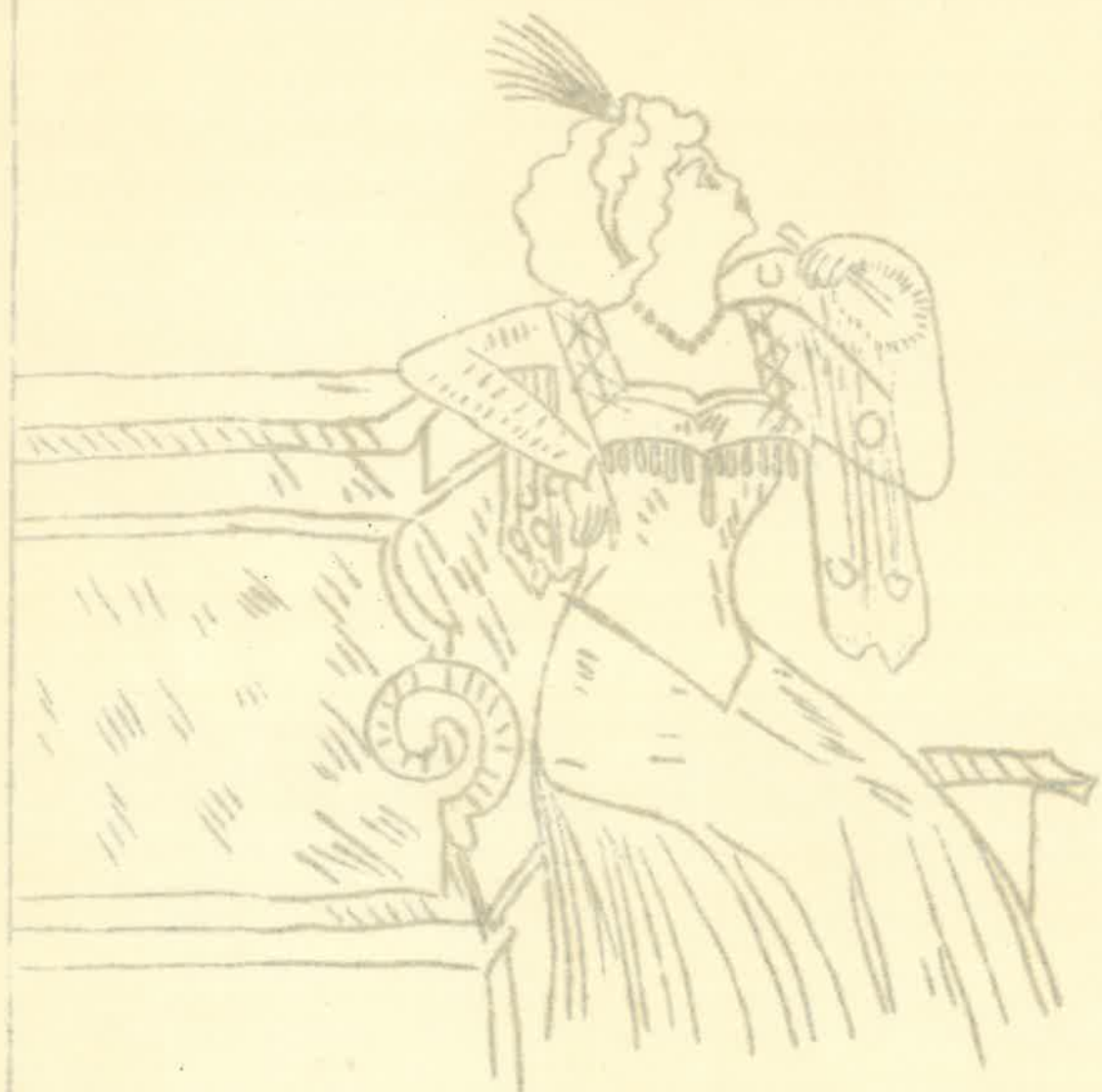

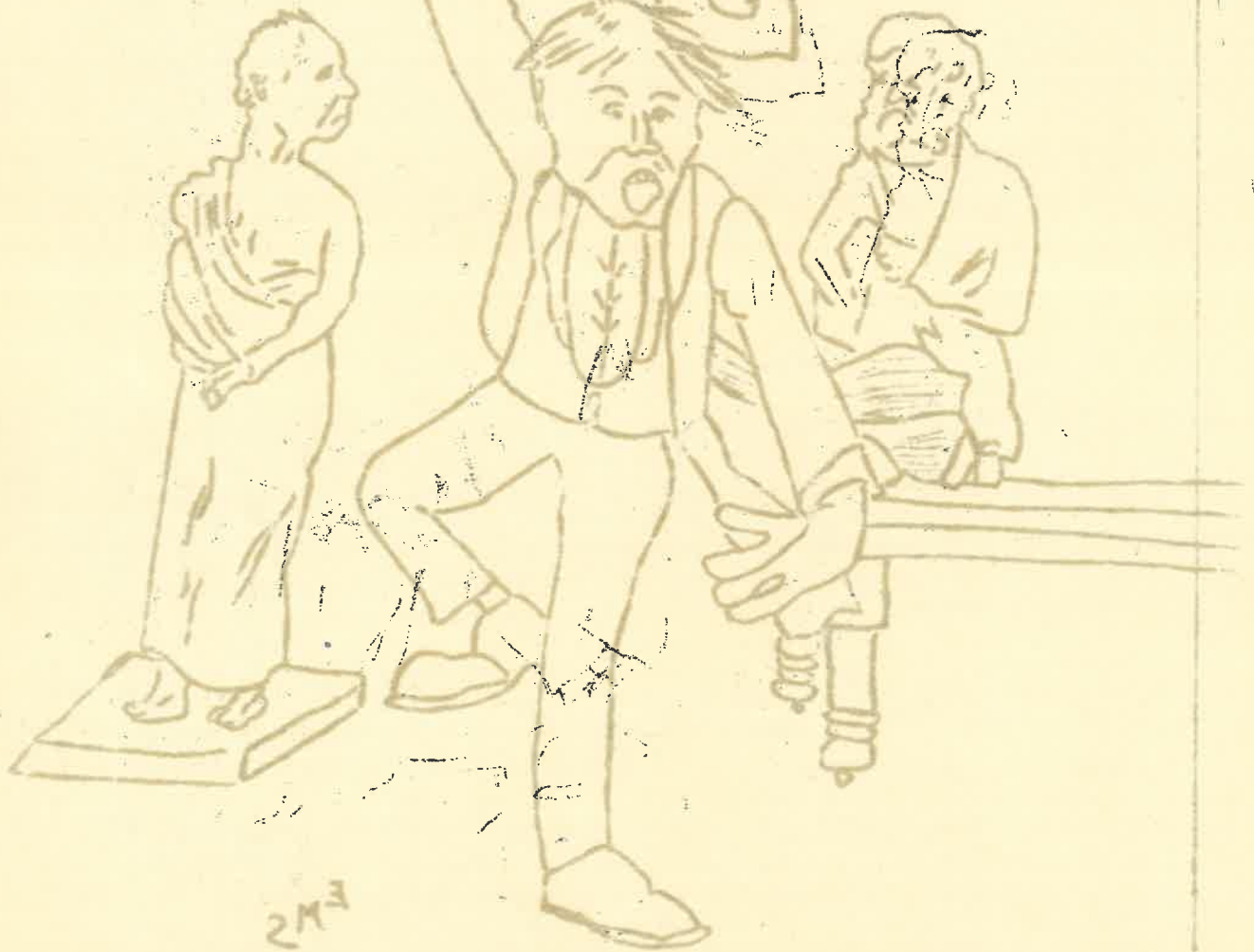

Every student in High School should turn out for the annual contest because it is very good practice and even though you don't win the experience gained is worth your while.

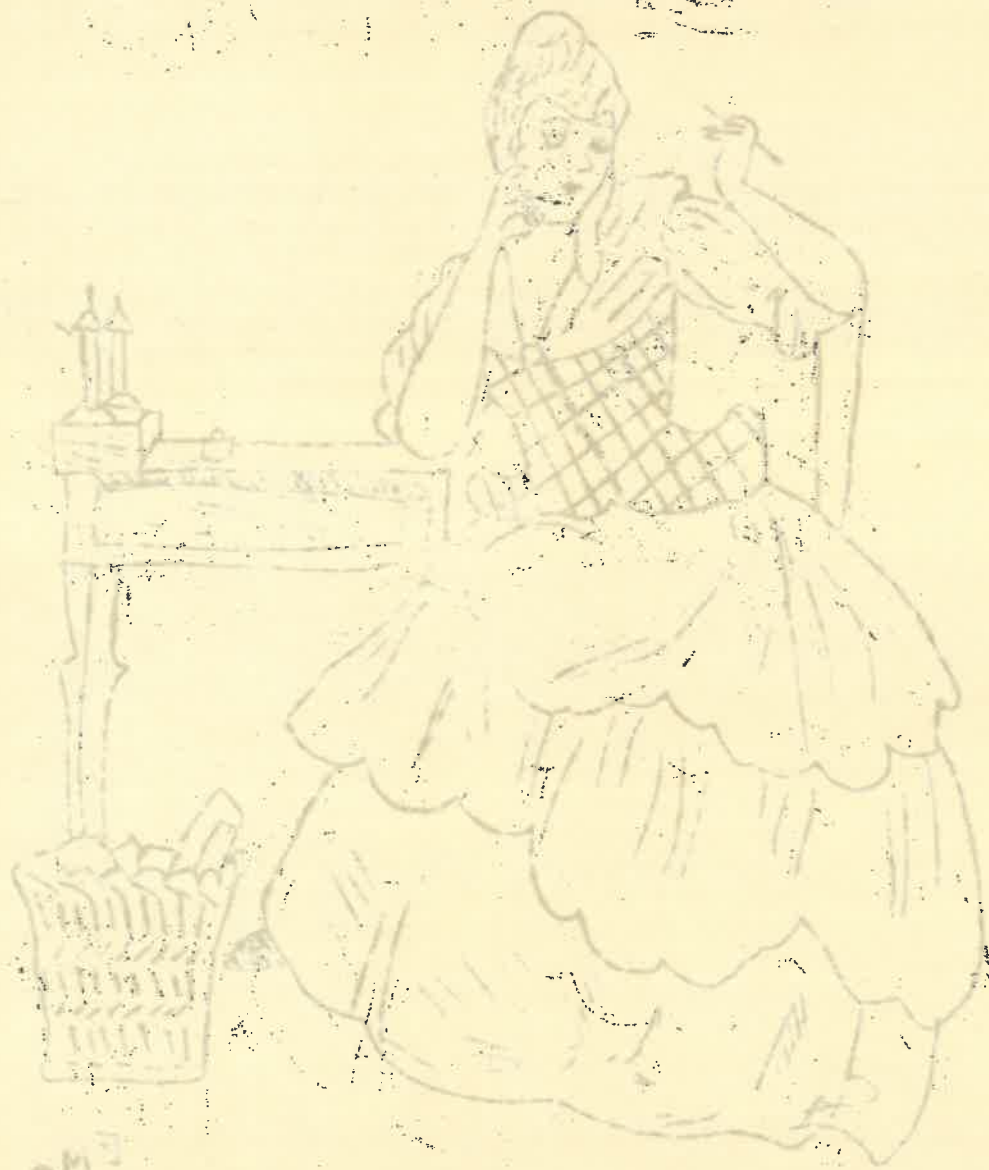
