## "SENIOR CLASS HISTORY OF 1933"

After a frivolous and happy three months of vacation 17 girls and 16 boys with much noise and forced dignity entered the Lind High School assembly and proceeded to find their seats, without any advice from the upper classmen who stood staring wide-eyed at the new comers.

After we were settled and were counted it was found that the following people were the green and wondering freshmen: Isabel Cozine, Emma Englehart, Angeline Gleick, Elsie Gust, Rachel Haase, Verna Hayes, Madeline Henchel, Sylva Irby, Leona Jensen, Annabel Moorman, Evelyn Moore, Mina Motley, Bertha Schrenk, Hazel Swarts, Irene Wilson, Elsie Gross, Ona Imus, Dorothea Schutz, Nina Moore, Roy Bell, Emil Bierman, George Burlis, Fred Damon, Donald Cheeseman, Howard Daniels, Woodrow Dirstine, Emil Fode, Sidney Graham, Henry Jansen, Harry Káspér, Ulric Krehbiel, Albert Labes, Chester Phillips, Louis Rickman, L. J. Weston, Dale Starring, and Cordes Seethoff.

The members we lost in the transfer were: Lena Gust, Eva Rott, and Thelma Woodland. The new ones we had picked up were: Cordes Seethoff, Howard Daniels, Emma Englehart, Rachel Haase, Elsie Gust, Leona Jensen, Ona Imus, Dorothea Schutz, and Nina Moore.

We were very happy to see that our class had increased greatly regardless of our loss of a few.

We chose Beatrice Dayton as our Class Advisor, Mina Motley President, Angeline Gleick, Vice President, and Sylva Irby, Secretary and Treasurer. Our Class colors were Green and White, Green to show our natural selves and white for Purity.

Our activities were, an Algebra party every two weeks to which only the Algebra class was invited. An all-high school Party to which everyone was to come dressed as small children, which was very appropriate for them. A Wiener Roast which was held at the Tressel.

School was out May 23, and the event was celebrated with a Big all High School Picnic. At Sprague Lake.

When vacation was over we entered our Sophomore year much learned and with a great keal of knowledge that we had accumulated in our Freshman year. This year beginning September 3, 1930 with the same group as when we were Frosh except for the loss of the following: Emma Englehart, Elsie Gust, Mina Moore, Ona Imus, Dorothea Schutz, Leona Jensen, Evelyn Moore, Madeline Henchel, George Burlis, Donald Cheeseman, Roy Bell, Howard Daniels. Our new member was Keith Weston.

We elected Mabelle Laiten Class Advisor, Cordes Seethoff, President, Sylva Irby, Vice President, and Sidney Graham, Secretary and Treasurer.

The year passed with the usual events of Basket Ball, Baseball, Tennis and some other outside activities that go along with the rest of the school term. School ended May 15.

Our Junior Year started September 7, 1931. We had a few new members who were: Clarence Hayes, Albert Laib, Marion and Rubona Lane, Arnold Franz, Leona Jensen, and Dorothea Schutz who entered at mid-year.

Helen Telford was chosen Class Advisor, Clarence Hayes, President, Mina Motley, Vice President, and Verna Hayes, Secretary and Treasurer.

Time passed swiftly and slong with it came the annual course of study and exams for us as well as for the rest of High School. At this time Girl's Basketball was taken up, the girls entering from our class were: Mina Motley, Sylva Irby, Irene Wilson, and Isabel Cozine. Mina made the first string by being on the star forwards the rest of us took our places on the bench.

Our first big event was the Junior Prom, that was held March 18th, in the Lind Auditorium. The music was furnished by the "Domino Orchestra". The hall was decorated in our class colors, green and white, for our class as well as for St. Patricks day. Lunch was served at 11:30. A good crowd attended and everything went well.

On April 29, 1932 the Junior-Senior Banquet, was held in the school house on the main floor. The dinner being cooked by the following Junior Girls: Mina Motley, Hazel Swarts, Sylva Irby, Isabel Cozine and Annabel Moorman. The Sophomore girls served, those participating were: Thelma and Velma Longmeier, Velma Hayes, Dena Gross, Wanda Gust, and Evelyn Campbell, they were dressed neatly in white. The High School Faculty and the Seniors of '32 were the guests. The tables in the hall were decorated in green and white streamers. and placed on the floor at convenient places were floor lamps that helped to add attraction. The total number of persons attending was 56. The dinner was very nicely and cleverly served. The program consisted of speeches by the guests and a few mucical numbers. The Banquet proved a big success and everyone had a very good time.

Our last big event of the year was the Burial of the Senior Class of '32. The Seniors took up the idea that they were going on their Sneak, and one morning about 5 o'clock they left only a trail of dust to remember them by. The Juniors decided they were going to bury them and be rid of them for good. Several of the boys went down and got the old hearse and hitched Mr. N. H. Smith's mules to it and brought it up to the school house where a casket made of an old wooden box with several bones in it to represent the Seniors, was placed into it. Their flowers were sage-brush. Under the Will, Prophecy, and the History was read, and the last song sung the Procession marched thru town and pictures were taken which were sent to the Spokesman Review as news and to show our appreciation that they were gone. The Senior Class was then brought to the North hill above the school house and buried. A rock was erected as the tombstone. We thought we had done a good job but Alas! they returned to haunt us not in spirit but in reality. They stayed until the Commencement exercises were held and then they were gone much to our satisfaction as we were not ready to take their places. School was out May 20.

Again on September 6, 1932, we plodded our weary way to school for our last year. Again we counted our number and found that we had lost Harry Kasper and Chester Phillips in our fast race for knowledge, and we had acquired only Erna Schneider as a new member. Our class advisor was Supt. H. H. Campbell who was willed to us by the thoughtful class of 1932. Clarence Hayes was reelected as President, Fred Damon, Vice President, and Verna Hayes, Secretary and Mina Motley, Treasurer.

No wonderful or very important events happened except for extra Baseball, Basket Ball, and Tennis.

During the course of the year it was discovered that in the Class were five members still together, having attended this school every year for 12 years. Those members were, Isabell Cozine, Hazel Swarts, Irene Wilson, Ulric Krehbiel and L. J. Weston. They had stuck together like glue not being apart during the 12 years. It was quite a record and we are proud of it.

On April 1, the Senior Class play was given in the High School gym. A large crowd attended the play and it was enjoyed by everyone. The name of it was "Polishing Papa", a domestic comedy, directed by Miss Helen J. Telford, a very efficient directress. Those taking part were: Sylva Irby, Fred Damon, Henry Jansen, Harry Kasper, Sidney Graham, Ulric Krehbiel, Bertha Schrenk, Verna Hayes, and Leona Jensen. Irene Wilson acted as advertising manager and also business manager, Albert Labes and Ulric Krehbiel were the property managers. The total amount cleared was \$81.80.

On April 14th the Juniors gave the Junior-Senior banquet. They followed our policy of last year and cooked the meal themselves and served it in the schoolhouse. Speeches and some musical entertainment furnished by different members present was enjoyed immensely and everyone present had a nice time, thanks to the thoughtful Juniors and more power to them. Wanda Gust acted as toastmistress, and she proved to be an excellent one.

April 21, 22, and 23, three noble Seniors namely, Hazel Swarts, Henry Jansen and Irene Wilson accompanied by Miss Helen Telford and Mr. H. H. Campbell, motored to Pullman for the yearly High School Student Convention. A good time was had by all and also a certain amount of knowledge concerning College and College life was brought back and told to the High School Wednesday, following their return on Sunday, May 23.

May 5, 6, and 7 the Senior Class accompanied by Mr. H. H. Campbell and Miss Martha Schroeder left Lind in a cloud of dust at 5:30 Friday morning. We arrived in Spokane about 7:15. Some proceeded to go window shopping while others went to the Studios to have their pictures taken. At 10 o'clock we met at the Dessert Hotel and we then motored out to the Armour's Packing house. Everyone went through and enjoyed themselves, while acquiring some knowledge.

We stopped at the Mission Park and had lunch. One of the boys and girls played Tennis. In the afternoon we went through the Sperry Flour Mill.

We arrived at our Cabin at Liberty Lake at 6 o'clock. Sunday evening we arrived in Lind about 8:30, a tired but happy group of lucky Seniors.

Sunday May, 14, Baccalaureate was held and Rev. John Seethoff who was the main speaker gave a very good and educational talk, which was a benefit to all.

Tuesday, May 16, the annual Senior Class Day Exercises were held in the Gym. A large number of people attended and were successfully entertained by the humorous numbers by the members of the Class of '33.

Thursday, May 18, Commencement, the final activity of the Senior Class was held. A large group of parents, relatives, and friends attended to see the Seniors of 1933 for the last time that they would

ever be together, and to see them pass on leaving many memories in their wake.

In leaving we wish all the success and happiness in the world to those classes who follow us, and to the faculty who have helped us to accomplish our graduation goal.

So ends the High School Career of the Class of 1933. We part with regret from our dear old Alma Mat<sup>r</sup>, but we must go on to make room for those coming up and to conquer the future that is before us and add other chapters to our History that may have many good opportunities in store for us.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

We, the Senior Class of 1933, of Lind High School, being of sound mind and reasonably good judgement, do hereby make, execute and publish and declare this to be our last will and testament, in the manner following, and do hereby, by this will, revoke and annul all wills made by the members of said class heretofore, individually or collectively, including any and all promises, verbal or otherwise, which may in any manner conflict with statements contained in this document, including individual promises made without due deliberation or careful consideration. It is hereby decreed that any conflicting promises must be regarded as having not been made with due deliberation or careful consideration, and are thereby declared revoked in accordance with this last will and testament made and executed this 16 day of May 1933, A. D. and the one-hundred-fifty-seventh year of the independence of the United States of America.

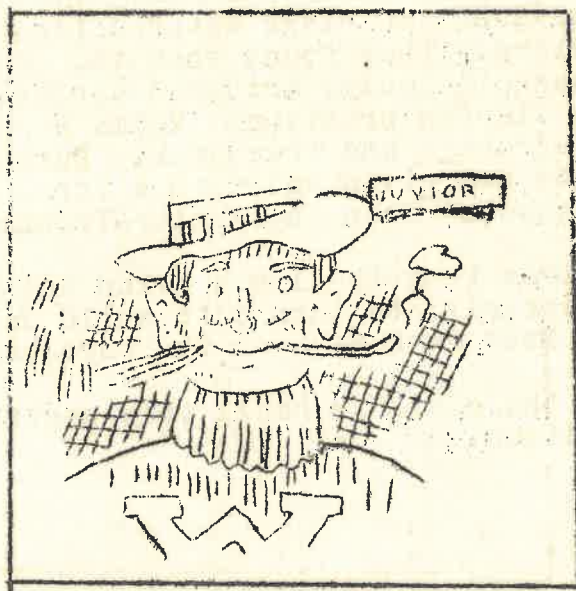

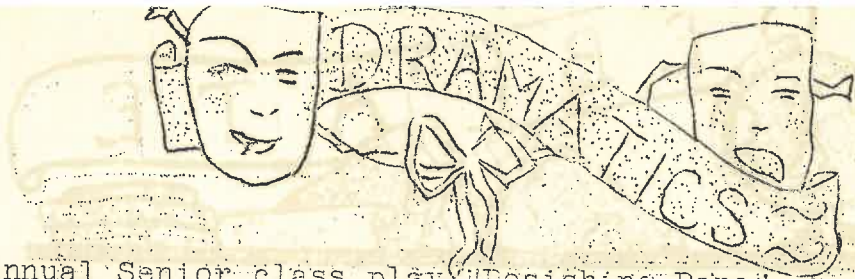

All officers took their positions immediately, and it was decided that meetings be held every other Friday afternoon and each class, starting with the Freshmen were to give a twenty minute program to entertain the rest of the High School.

Lee Shrontz, Freshman, Phyllis Kasper, Sophomore, Emil Bierman, Junior, and Bob Adanson and Fred Damon were elected on the Council, to meet with the President, Vice President and Secretary, to discuss and advise the rest of the Student Body on all problems brought up.

The real reason of the Associated Student Body, is to bring all the students together under an organization to work together and to bring about more of a school spirit.

A season ticket was made out for 13 adults, 80 High school students 16 Junior High, and 9 Grade students, which entitled them to attend all basket-ball games, baseball games and tennis tournaments. All tickets amounted to \$161.00.

The Association carried out many problems of their own, namely buying all equipment for Basket-ball, base-ball, and tennis and track, and also donating both money and help to the play field.

A large sum of money was taken in at both basketball and baseball games and also the all high school play to help and patronize of the town people in backing our school activities.

The Association plans to use the balance of money in the treasurer in buying all equipment to start a foot-ball team next year.

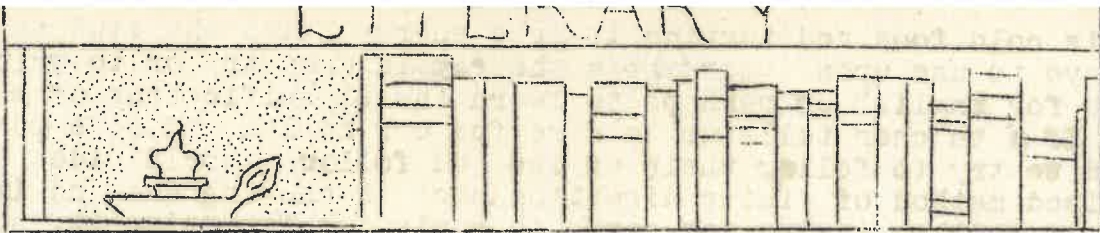

GUM CHEWING SHOULD BE ALLOWED IN GEOMETRY CLASS

Gum chewing should be allowed in Geometry class first because to prohibit it is against the principles of democracy.

As long as men have been on earth there has been a struggle for personal liberty. During the stone ages man revolted against a form of rule under which they had no representation or any other way of making their own rules for governing themselves. At various times in the history of mankind we read where governments have been established allowing this freedom but always it seems that a class of people would arise and all would be lost. It seems that this is taking place now. We read of Romans having a senate chosen from the people which made the laws which govern them. But Julius Causar it seems converted himself into a Dictator taking actually all the power away from the senate and the people and ruling himself. After his assassination the government became so disorganized that all seemed to be lost.

Again in the times of King John of England the people arose and forced him to sign the Magna Charta allowing them some liberties, but this was not enough for the more courageous of the people and in later years it was people of England and all the other countries who had a love of personal liberty to immigrate to North America where they could start a government in which all classes of people could have an equal opportunity here under the guiding hand of such great statesmen as George Washington, Tom Jefferson, Alexander Hamilton, and Ben Franklin. They created a government meant to last all time, a government of the people, by the people and for the people. Let us not destroy this heroic move to make a perfect government by making rules that take away the personal liberty of the individuals. Let us strive rather than the work of these great patriots and pioneers that braved the stormy seas and the years of hardship and toil that they nourished in this land that they sacrificed in this land that their children might be born in this land of democracy, a land with no peasants, no serfs, no lords, or barons, a land where all might be equal and there would be no legislation without representation.

For school teachers to make rules limiting the right of future citizens of our land to perform a healthful, harmless, inoffensive, recreative act. Taking away such a privilege would be certainly the principle upon which the nation was founded. It would lead the future citizens to doubt whether this nation has that personal liberty of which we are wont to hear so much of. It would tend to make us believe that perhaps this great land of ours is losing its democratic form of government. And returning to tyrannical state of some order. If this should come to pass it would be very disastrous. Do you not realize the danger in causing our future citizens to lose their lives for the government for which their forefathers gave their lives their fortunes, their homes their all? Would this not tend to counteract the sacrifice that millions of mothers made in 1917 and 1918 in giving up their sons that the world might be made safe for democracy? So let us consider very carefully before we create any such undemocratic, tyrannical rule of prohibiting school students to chew gum. Let us remember that our constitution of which we are so justly proud, plainly states that the life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness, are not to be deprived of anyone without the due process of law.

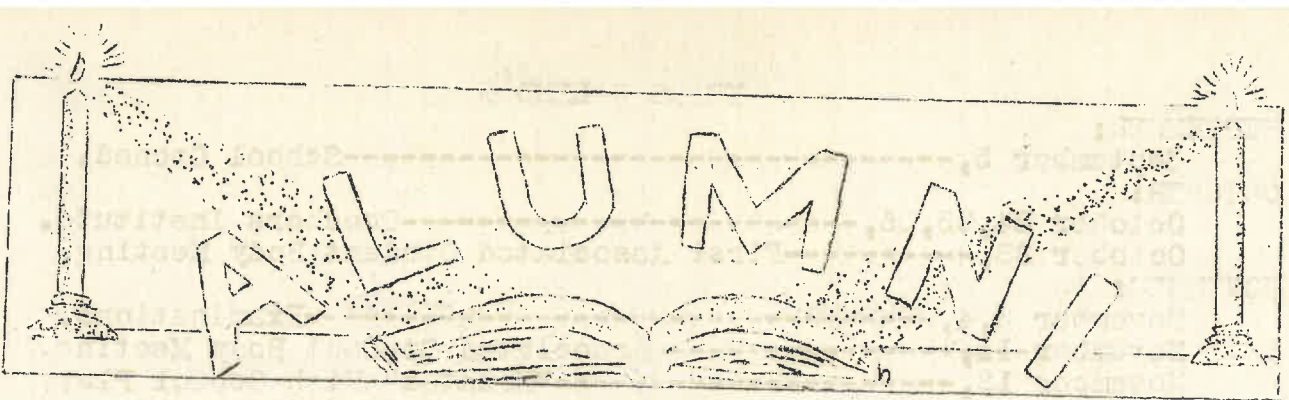
The second reason why a rule to forbid students chewing gum should be eliminated from our schools is that it is a healthy practice. We are so often told during classes at school that we should look after our health and are urged to do so many things take care of our physical welfare that it is a wonder schools do not furnish fun for the student to chew instead of prohibiting it. Have you not read upon many a bill board of magazine how gum chewing aids digestion and when students are forced to come many miles to school and carry cold lunches which are hard to digest it is a wonder that they should follow their hygiene or physiology teachers advice and resort to some such practice as gum chewing to aid their digestion organs in handling this cold food and taking it into energy which the students must

ing this cold food and turning it into energy which the student must have to use upon working a theorem in Geometry or to write a theme for English or perhaps to learn the classification of mammals. If a teacher tells us to care for our health and safeguard it, and we try to follow their advice and follow a world wide advertised method of aiding digestion such as chewing gum and immediately another instructor seeks to punish us for doing it, such as writing a 1000 word theme, is not that tending to befuddle the growing intellect of the young boy or girl? Also we have read that gum chewing cleans and preserves the teeth. Thus it has not only good quality as an aid to health. And again we may make an example of the student from the country who must arise so early to catch the bus for school that he, or she, has no time in which to brush their teeth thoroughly at home and as carrying a toothbrush and toothpaste to school would be most unhandy and obnoxious they must again resort to the product of whose teeth cleaning properties they have heard and read so much of, namely chewing gum. So to limit the students privileges in not allowing him, or her, to chew gum it might be ruining his health not only of the digestion but also the teeth.

Third we are taught in school to make ourselves agreeable and attract to others to do this it is obvious that we must remove all such unpleasant odors from our breath such as onions, garlic, liver burger cheese, and so on. The country student who rises and eats his breakfast in a great hurry has not time to stop and make experiments to see whether the food he has eaten will leave an unpleasant odor or not, and then when that student reads in some magazine advertisement where some romance has been shattered by such an embarrassing situation and not wishing to suffer likewise can you wonder if he looks for a remedy that will perfume his breath and rid him of this odor which he has no way of knowing whether he has it or not.

So we see that gum chewing should be allowed in school, first because it prohibits it could cause the student to loose faith in our country, second because it is healthful both to the digestive organs and to the teeth and last but not least because it removes the student from the fear of annoying other with unpleasant breath.
