We are the class of 1980. When we graduate we will have been the 75TH class to graduate from good ole' Ritzville High!




Fight to the finish.

They finished 3-2 and in second place in the Bi-county behind Liberty. The year was highlighted by Homecoming's 19-12 victory over league champ Liberty. Another highlight was the 14-12 comeback win over Wilbur. A great catch on a two point conversion with 1 minute left won the game.

A lot of individuals contributed to this year's Bronco efforts. Scott Sprenger caught 45 passes for 550 yards and 7 TD's. Brian Gering played both running back and flanker and scored TD's from both places. Jay Weise, Marty Sackmann and Brian Gering all had over 100 yd. games from the tailback position. 
Good-Bye

The main purpose of student government is to give the individual a voice in what is to effect them directly. This year the council tried to stress student involvement by asking for opinions, ideas and open discussions. In order to maintain this, and still worthwhile student management, dittos dealing with Parliamentary procedures were given to council members early in the year and the rules were followed at the meetings. We also strove to accomplish more than was merely necessary.

Complimentary tickets were distributed in limited amounts, finances were restored to a workable system and were kept that way the entire year.

For the first time in years, Ritzville High operated out of debt.

For all practical reasons Homecoming was rescheduled; conflicts existed within the previous date.

Amendments were once again made in the constitution. Also donations were made in honor of Jimmy Snyder and memorial fund resulted. Annual costs were discussed in great detail. Probably the most controversial topic was the election of a new assistant treasurer. The past treasurer resigned and the assistant moved to her spot, leaving the council with a never dealt with before conflict. By following the school constitution, section four, subsection three, a new assistant was appointed.

There are also the "trivial" things of student government. 



This year the chapter also held the annual Father-Daughter Banquet, and will put on the Mother's Tea.






