Many changes in the staff at RHS have taken place. The year started out with a significant change in the administration. Mr. John Eikum took the position of Superintendent and Mr. Lynn Lupfer filled the post of RHS Principal. Three new additions were made to the teaching staff, Mrs. Jean Gaittens as librarian and English teacher, Mr. Jerry Walker as Spanish and German teacher and Mrs. Renee Matson as guidance counselor.

In an attempt to make all classes available to students, a double class structure was added. During one period, two different classes were taught by the same instructor.



One of the first problems faced by the council this year was the vacancy of the vice-president office. The former vice-president moved from Ritzville, so new elections were held.

The council also set up the Constitution Committee. It is this committee's job to handle amendments to the ASB constitution. The purchase of a disco sound system was also examined by the council.

Perhaps the biggest hurdle faced by the hard working representatives was the problem of distributing concession money. A steady concessions staff was hired. The council voted to divide the profits between the ASB and the four classes. Another fund was set aside to be distributed to organizations at the council's discretion.

There will always be problems to solve, but people working hard and together can find solutions.


In order to have a truly representative student government the students must voice their desire and opinions. It is through the student council that these feelings are expressed and acted upon.





In 1977, the Bronco football team enjoyed its finest season, under head coach Mike Lynch, narrowly missing the play-offs and ending the year with a 6-2 record.

After losing the initial game of the year 12-0 to Kittitas they opened up and won 5 straight games before losing a heart-breaker to Reardan and ending the season with a 7-0 victory over Davenport.

The Garfield Pirates were the first victims in our winning streak. League opponents Wilbur, Odessa, Freeman, and Liberty accounted for the next 4 wins.

Against Reardan, in the league title game, the Indians rolled to a 26-0 first half lead, before the Broncos came to life in the 3rd period. In that exciting 3rd quarter of play, the Broncos exploded for 20 points, closing the gap to 26-20, and ready to score another touchdown. But the next Reardan possession spelled disaster as Indian quarterback Rick Krupke galloped 60 yards for a score, to make the final tally 34-20.

In the win over Davenport, Ritzville regained a little pride and poise and beat the Gorillas on a touchdown pass from Kenny "Spud" Hilzer to Jeff Glaspie with 26 seconds left in the contest.

The Bronco J.V.'s had a struggling season, ending with a 4-3 record.

Coach Olson responded that there were no real highlights. Every game was real close, with no contest being really one sided.




Ross and Mary Mae were selected to compete for a National Honor Society Scholarship.


