

















Dedicated to a special person. Mr. Robert Babbitt

Mr. Babbitt's advice to this year's graduating seniors is: "Set yourself some realistic goals in life and work at achieving them."























Leadership and Direction of the ASB

1987-88 was a good year for football at RHS. The year started with a return of exseasoned players along with new recruits.




Homecoming Stampede '87


























The J.V. Girls Basketball Team Have a great Season







Teamwork Drives Girls Varsity Basketball

Mr. Eric Driessen felt that the team had improved individually. They also improved in dribbling and in defense.












The team did exceptionally well this year, ending up 4th in league with a 11-8 record. Even though they did not press forward from that point, they did accomplish many things during the season.


