HISTORY OF THE CLASS OF 1935

At the first class meeting they chose Miss Martha Schroeder as class advisor. The colors were three shades of green, flower was the Water Lily, and motto "One for the other and all for the class".

The death of Henry Ochletree, one of the pepiest and most popular of the boys, saddened the entire high school as well as causing a much sorrowed vacancy in the Freshman ranks.

The Class has worked and played and proved themselves to be one of the pepiest classes L.H.S. has known for a long time.

In September 1935 our Sophmore class entered the high school building with the attitude of working. We had one of the largest classes in the high school. We lost seven members, those being: Tillie Deerheim, Dan Haase, Esther Sauer, Clarence Schragg, Viola Schragg, and Max Skinner.

Basket ball started and in our class Thelma Anderson, Dorothea Stearns, Jeane Schutz, Martha Roth, Hulda Haase, Wilma Graham, Bernice Brittenham, Ferrell Tallent, and Phyllis Kasper joined the squads.

This class was well represented in all the high school athletics.

This year Jeanne Schutz, Ferrell Tallent, Bernice Brittenham, and Margurite Berry were on the debate team.

Edwin Longmeier, Bob Adamson and Bill Ferrell were the members of the boys basket ball team.

A weiner roast was given on Wednesday night May 10 and no one but Sophmores were invited. No parties of any kind were given.

In September we entered as Juniors, of course trying to be as sophisticated as possible.

We soon found that we had lost Ruth Lobe, James Moorman, and later in the year lost Alfred Sackman and Bob Watkins, but Esther Bauer and Bob Timm were gained.

An all high school party was given.

Jeanne Schutz, Bernice Brittenham, Alphonso Manfred, Wilbur Krug, and Ferrell Tallent were in the all high school play "Depend on Me".

Martha Roth, Dorothea Stearns, Jeanne Schutz, Bernice Brittenham and Ferrell Tallent made the debate team this year.

Bob Adamson, Bill Farrell, and Tub Longmeier, made the basket ball squad.

Hulda Haase, Jean Schutz, Bernice Brittenham, Wilma Graham, Martha Roth, Ferrell Tallent, Dorothea Stearns, Thelma Anderson, Dorothy Steffins, and Phyllis Kasper made the girls basketball squad.

The annual prom was given on March 10th in the Gym and was a huge success, financially as well as socially. This was the first year a dance was permitted to be given in the school gym but it proved to be very successful. The music by Johnny Stoops Orchestra of Ritzville, was good; everything was orderly, and it proved to be a well conducted dance. The Gym was cleverly decorated in three shades of green, the Junior class colors. The orchestra was surrounded by a latticed screen, and colored gloves were attached to the lights. Flowers were used to add a spring atmosphere to the setting. Refreshments were served at 11:30 and were well carried out under the direction of Bernice Brittenham.

On May 4th the Junior-Senior banquet was held at the Hotel Central one of the largest and most successful banquets given in years.

There were 62 Juniors and Seniors and Faculty members present to enjoy the banquet and dancing afterwards.

Ah! Seniors at last.

This year we lost Velma and Thelma Longmeier, and Bob Timm for a half of a year.

On October 30 the Seniors and Sopomores had to give the Juniors and Freshman a party because they sold more Student body tickets than the Seniors and Sophmores. It was an all high school party given at the gym.

Bernice Brittenham, Marguerite Berry, Martha Roth, Ferrell Tallent turned out for debate. Bernice was also a faithful editor of the "LITTLE LIND LEADER".

On April 27 the Seniors presented "HOLD EVERYTHING". Those who took part in the play were: Jean Schutz, Ferrell Tallent, Martha Roth, Edwin Longmeier, Bernice Brittenham, Phyllis Kasper, Roy Smith, Lloyd DeVore, Bill Ferrell, Wilbur Krug, Agnes Damon and Justine Beck.

A Senior Ball was given at the Gym on April 18.

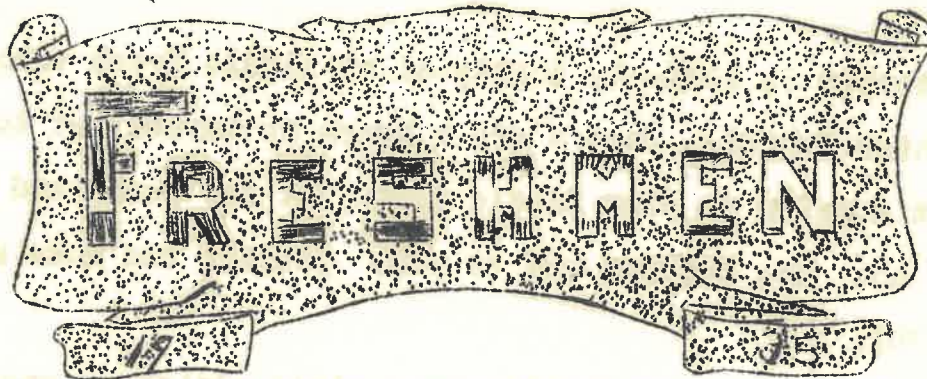

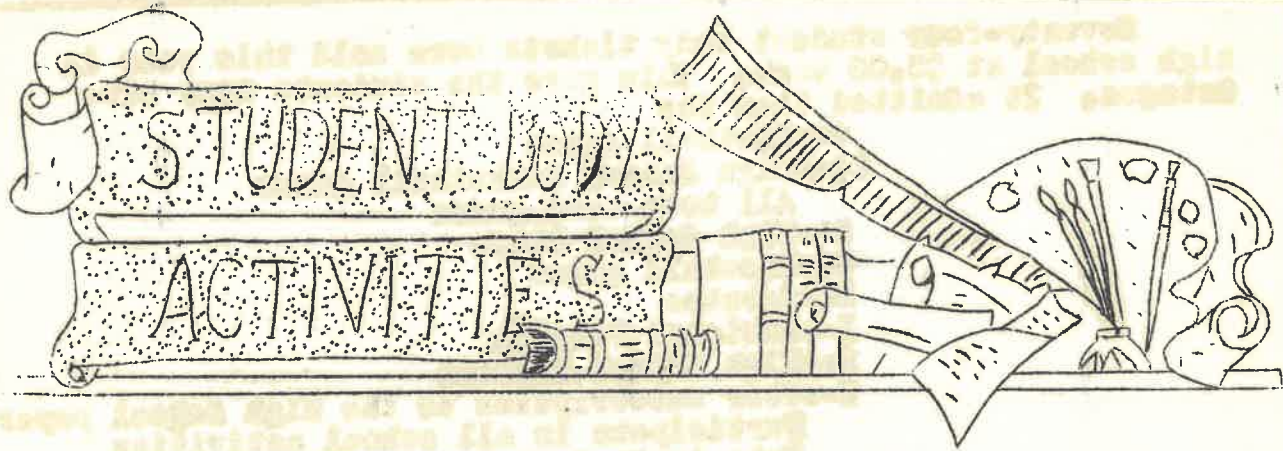

The organization of the Associated Student Body has been most successful this year. It has supported any activities, namely; girls and boys basketball, baseball debate, tennis, track and music. After expenses for the year have been deducted from the gross profits we find ourselves far above the red line.

During the past year the Student Body has paid for all the transportation of the various activities carried on by the school. This amounted to \$153.94. This is an extra-ordinarily large sum of money paid out by the students. If this were transferred to the school board budget, as we await the time when it shall be, we would be able to spend this amount of money when it shall be, we would be able to spend this amount of money toward remodeling and adding to our various activities.

Basketball, Baseball and Football were on the whole, as a rule, self-supporting. \$72 was spent on referees during the school term. This included football, basketball and debate judges. We were very fortunate in getting competent persons at a most reasonable price. Emil Fode, Fred Beck and Mr. Beaudreau offered their services for various regular games; however, for tournament games, regular officials were hired.

Candy was sold at practically all the basketball games. This was done, however, more as a favor for the 'lovers of sweets' rather than for the profit returns: although we always came out on top.

The school board was very good to the students this year. A balcony was built part way around the gymnasium and the floor was sanded and revarnished. The balcony has been especially useful this year as larger crowds attended the basketball games and we were able to take care of all those who attended. After the balcony was put in use we found it necessary to have ushers to prevent overcrowding the balcony and also to keep children from sitting there. Two alumni boys, Harry Kasper, and Henry Jansen, were kind enough to offer their services for this work. As a gift of appreciation both boys were given complimentary basketball season tickets.

Next year the board plans on installing a cement tennis court, which if carried through, will be a marvelous step toward the betterment of the school. The high school students will certainly appreciate this improvement.

The student Body also helped finance the cleaning of the Lind Civic Playfield. The Baseball team was very generous in sponsoring this movement, which was followed by the school. A number of high school students willingly offered their services toward its remodeling, and it was completed after a weeks steady labor.

With the efficient group of members which were elected into the Council for next year, more progress, more fun, and fewer limitations should be their goal.
