

If in years to come, this edition of Progress brings back pleasant memories it will have accomplished its purpose.





We honored the Seniors with the annual Junior-Senior Banquet on April 25. The Home Ec. room was decorated in the class colors of red and white, with tables, walls, and memory books decorated with stick figures. Melvin Gust was our able toastmaster for the occasion.

Yes! Our last year of high school at last! was quite a year and Mr. Kadlec was kept pretty busy being our class advisor. We found we had lost Bruce Reeve and regained Everett Oylear. To direct the work of our final year, we elected Lenard Wahl, President; Melvin Gust, Vice-President; Doris Pederson, Secretary; and Alice Copp, Treasurer. Representatives at Large were Betty Angelo and Elaine Lyle. Again we tookpart in manyhigh schoolactivities.

Bill Grafmiller's wonderful orchestra played for our Senior Ball on Nov. 1. The gym was decorated in red and white with "Peg O'My Heart" as the theme. Everyone had a good time.

The Senior Play, "Don't Keep Him Waiting " was presented on March 19. This hilarious comedy was a big success and was enjoyed by everyone.

A clever Class Day program was presented on Friday May 21. Baccalaureate Services were on the following Sunday. Finally on Wednesday, May 26, we received those diplomas, for which we had worked so long and hard, at Commencement, ending our high school career. Our days in L. H. S. have been happy and profitable and we hope that future classes will have as much fun as we have had.
