

DARLENE GALLION—Keep up the good attendance. Somebody has to go to school around here.



JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET


The Junior-Senior Banquet was held May 1, 1951 and proved to be very successful.







On February 6, the Ritzville girls met the Lind girls in a basketball bout. Ritzville went home very happy because of a triumph over us.




